Dr. Jennifer Snow currently serves as Co-Chair of Keyboard Studies at the UCLA Herb Alpert School of Music where she teaches piano, collaborative piano, and pedagogy. Most recently, she was appointed as the Director of Teacher Pedagogy at the Royal Conservatory in Toronto.

Jennifer has presented at conferences including MTNA, EPTA, CMS, WPPC, and NCKP. Jennifer is active as a judge and adjudicator, is a senior examiner for the Royal Conservatory Examinations and the National Music Certificate Program, and is a clinician for Frederick Harris Music Company.

Jennifer is a versatile performer who has appeared as a solo and collaborative pianist throughout Canada, the United States, Asia, and Europe. A diverse and active recitalist, Jennifer is heard on CBC and NPR and has recorded for Marquis, Amberola and Phoenix Records. She has also played for the Showtime! Network, TV Ontario, Edmonton Symphony Orchestra series, Kilburn Artist series, Banff Centre Festival, Ottawa Chamber Music festival, Stratford Festival, ABC Television, Debut Atlantic, and Piano Plus. Her performances include collaborative projects with international soloists and members of orchestras from across the continent.
